That the City Manager or designee is authorized to submit the State Homeland Security Program grant application number 2951006 for the project titled "Sustainment of Fire Department Special Response Teams" through the Texas Office of the Governor including all related paperwork, including but not limited to, authorization of budget transfers, and/or revisions to the operation plan, and to accept, reject, amend, correct, and/or terminate the grant, in the amount of \$95,406.02, for the period from September 1, 2020 through August 31, 2021, for a project that supports a Type I Hazardous Material Team; and that in the event of loss or misuse of the grant funds, the City of El Paso assures that it will return the funds to the Office of the Governor in full.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION:

This grant will assist with the sustainment and improve the El Paso Fire Department's ability to protect, respond and recover from incidents that originate from acts of terrorism (internationally or domestically), technological or natural disasters and accidentally caused human events. The project supports a regional Type I Hazardous Materials Team and a Type II Urban Search and Rescue Team. El Paso's specialized teams support the following core capabilities: operational coordination, threat and hazard identification, environmental response/health and safety, situational assessment and mass search and rescue operations. The identified purchase items include a sensors and calibration gas for the hazardous materials air monitoring program.







Narrative Information

Overview

The purpose of the Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) is to support state and local efforts to prevent terrorism and other catastrophic events and to prepare the Nation for the threats and hazards that pose the greatest risk to the security of the United States. HSGP provides funding to implement investments that build, sustain, and deliver the 32 core capabilities essential to achieving the National Preparedness Goal (the Goal) of a secure and resilient Nation. The building, sustainment, and delivery of these core capabilities are not exclusive to any single level of government, organization, or community, but rather, require the combined effort of the whole community. HSGP supports core capabilities across the five mission areas of Prevention, Protection, Mitigation, Response, and Recovery based on allowable costs.

Primary Mission and Purpose

State Homeland Security Program (SHSP): Supports state, Tribal and local preparedness activities that address high-priority preparedness gaps across all core capabilities where a nexus to terrorism exists. All investments must be consistent with capability targets set during the Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) process, and gaps identified in the State Preparedness Report (SPR).

Many activities which support the achievement of target capabilities related to terrorism preparedness may simultaneously support enhanced preparedness for other hazards unrelated to acts of terrorism. However, **all SHSP projects must assist grantees in achieving target capabilities related to preventing, preparing for, protecting against, or responding to acts of terrorism.**

Eligibility Requirements

Criminal History Reporting

Entities receiving funds from PSO must be located in a county that has an average of 90% or above on both adult and juvenile dispositions entered into the computerized criminal history database maintained by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) as directed in the *Texas Code of Criminal Procedure, Chapter 66*. The disposition completeness percentage is defined as the percentage of arrest charges a county reports to DPS for which a disposition has been subsequently reported and entered into the computerized criminal history system.

Beginning January 1, 2020, counties applying for grant awards from the Office of the Governor must commit that the county will report at least 90 percent of convictions within seven business days to the Criminal Justice Information System at the Department of Public Safety. By January 1, 2021, such reporting must take place within five business days. Click [here](#) for additional information from DPS on this new reporting requirement.

Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR)

Eligible applicants operating a law enforcement agency must be current on reporting Part I violent crime data to the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) for inclusion in the annual Uniform Crime Report (UCR). To be considered eligible for funding, applicants must have submitted a full twelve months of accurate data to DPS for the most recent calendar year.

Conversion to National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS)

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) has established a goal set by the Texas Legislature for all local law enforcement agencies to implement and report crime statistics data by using the requirements of the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS). Additionally, the Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI) will collect required crime statistics solely through the NIBRS starting January 1, 2021. Due to this federal deadline, grantees are advised that eligibility for future grant funding may be tied to compliance with NIBRS. Financial grant assistance for transitioning to NIBRS may be available for your jurisdiction from the Public Safety Office.

National Incident Management System (NIMS) Implementation

Grantees are required to implement NIMS. The NIMS uses a systematic approach to integrate the best existing processes and methods into a unified national framework for incident management across all homeland security activities including prevention, protection, response, mitigation, and recovery. Grantees must use standardized resource management concepts for resource typing, credentialing, and an inventory to facilitate the effective identification, dispatch, deployment, tracking and recovery of resources.

Emergency Management Plans (Intermediate Level)

Cities and counties must have a current emergency management plan or be a legally established member of an inter-jurisdictional emergency management program with a plan on file with the Texas Department of Public Safety, Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM). Plans must be maintained throughout the entire grant performance period and must be at least at the Intermediate Level. If you have questions concerning your Emergency Management Plan (preparedness) level, contact your Emergency Management Coordinator (EMC) or your regional Council of Governments (COG). For questions concerning plan deficiencies, contact TDEM at tdem.plans@tdem.texas.gov.

Program Requirements

Program Income

Applicant agrees to comply with all federal and state rules and regulations for program income and agrees to report all program income that is generated as a result of the project's activities. Applicant agrees to report program income through a formal grant adjustment and to secure PSO approval prior to use of the program income. Applicant agrees to use program income for allowable costs and agrees to expend program income immediately after PSO's approval of a grant adjustment and prior to requesting reimbursement of funds.

Deduction Method - Program income shall be deducted from total allowable costs to determine the net allowable costs. Program income shall be used for current costs unless PSO authorizes otherwise. Program income which the grantee did not anticipate at the time of the award shall be used to reduce the PSO award and grantee match rather than to increase the funds committed to the project.

Asset Seizures and Forfeitures - Program income from asset seizures and forfeitures is considered earned when the property has been adjudicated to the benefit of the plaintiff (e.g., law enforcement entity).

Building and Sustaining Core Capabilities

1. All capabilities being built or sustained must have a clear link to one or more Core Capabilities in the National Preparedness Goal.
2. Many capabilities which support terrorism preparedness simultaneously support preparedness for other hazards. Grantees must demonstrate this dual-use quality for any activities implemented under this program that are not explicitly focused on terrorism preparedness. Activities implemented under SHSP must support terrorism preparedness by building or sustaining capabilities that relate to the prevention of, protection from, mitigation of, response to, and recovery from terrorism.
3. Funding should be used to sustain core capabilities. New capabilities should not be built at the expense of maintaining current and critically needed core capabilities. New capabilities must be aligned with capability targets and gaps identified through the THIRA/SPR process.

Mission Areas

The National Preparedness Goal organizes the core capabilities into the five mission areas:

- **Prevention.** Prevent, avoid or stop an imminent, threatened or actual act of terrorism.
- **Protection.** Protect our citizens, residents, visitors, and assets against the greatest threats and hazards in a manner that allows our interests, aspirations, and way of life to thrive.
- **Mitigation.** Reduce the loss of life and property by lessening the impact of future disasters.
- **Response.** Respond quickly to save lives, protect property and the environment, and meet basic human needs in the aftermath of a catastrophic incident.
- **Recovery.** Recover through a focus on the timely restoration, strengthening and revitalization of infrastructure, housing and a sustainable economy, as well as the health, social, cultural, historic and environmental fabric of communities affected by a catastrophic incident.

Project Summary :

Briefly summarize the project, including proposed activities and intended impact.

This project will assist with the sustainment and improve the El Paso Fire Department's ability to protect, respond and recover from incidents that originate from acts of terrorism (internationally or domestically), technological or natural disasters and accidentally caused human events. The project supports a regional Type I Hazardous Materials Team and a Type II Urban Search and Rescue Team. El Paso's specialized teams support the following core capabilities: operational coordination, threat and hazard identification, environmental response/health and safety, situational assessment and mass search and rescue operations. The teams were created using UASI funding. The loss of funding severely threatens the ability for the teams to continue to provide the expected level of service both locally and regionally. The project addresses gaps with training and equipment needed to maintain and improve response and recovery abilities. The identified purchase items include a sensors and calibration gas for the hazardous materials air monitoring program. This project will begin to close the gap for the response community of El Paso region. Without these investments in resources from this project, the ability to respond to acts of terrorism or calamity will be insufficient for the 2.5 million population of the region.

Problem Statement :

Provide a detailed account of the issues, threats or hazards that your project will target. The City and County of El Paso is located in remote West Texas, on the border with Juarez Mexico and the State of New Mexico. State of Texas resources are over 12 hours away in the Central Standard Time (CST) zone, while the El Paso region is aligned on the Mountain Standard Time (MST) zone. The next comparable metropolitan areas are Albuquerque, New Mexico, Tucson or Phoenix, Arizona. The Paso Del Norte region is recognized by local, state and federal agencies as an urban island. Given the isolation and unique problems of immediate border issues, El Paso uses a whole community approach with local, tribal, state, interstate, federal and international partners. El Paso's specialized teams are the only teams in the extreme West Texas region with the capability to protect communities from the consequences of all hazards, both natural and human caused. The potential for terrorist activities grows daily. El Paso supports a Type I Hazardous Materials Team, Type II Urban Search and Rescue Team, Type III Incident Management Team, and a Water Rescue Team which is deployable with Texas A&M Task Force One (TX-TF1). These teams are needed in the region to reduce the risk of chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear, and high-yield explosives (CBRNE) incidents through early detection and identification. These teams increase the state's ability to minimize damage and loss of life due to terrorism and criminal attacks through their emergency response. Specific issues faced by the community are acts of domestic and international terrorism, the ongoing violence due to drug trafficking, international mass migration, human smuggling, daily transportation of hazardous materials across the border, and public health emergency outbreaks. Within the RGCOG Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) 2019 identifies two scenarios in which the equipment provided by this project would help to close defined capability gaps. As identified in the RGCOG THIRA (page 7 & 10), during a human-caused terrorist chemical attack (page 7 & 10), the El Paso Fire Department Specialty Teams play a significant role in hazard mitigation, response, intelligence gathering, and recovery for the region.

Existing Capability Levels :

El Paso's specialized teams are the only teams in the West Texas Region with the capability to protect communities from the consequences of all hazards, both natural and human-caused. According to the RGCOG State Preparedness Report (SPR) 2019 (page 31), equipment needed to assess a hazmat incident is needed to meet the capacity target. The purchase of air monitoring equipment will close this gap in the event of a chemical attack (page 31).

Capability Gaps:

Impact Statement :

The El Paso Fire Department has a Type I Hazardous Materials Response team which provides response capability to the cities and county of El Paso, Texas as well as region 4 of TDEM and the State of New Mexico. Equipment and maintenance of key equipment enable this capability. Three different vendor systems (MSA, Honeywell, Dräger) are used to measure the quality of air during a hazmat incident. Maintenance of the air monitoring program requires a routine replacement of sensors and calibration gas to provide accuracy. The impact of having reliable equipment employed to monitor the air quality increases the safety of the hazmat personnel, the immediately effected victims and community at large. All of which are identified as current capability gaps within the 2019 RGCOG SPR.

Objective 4.7: Ensure access to and adequate support for homeland security and emergency preparedness and response training across all agencies, jurisdictions, and disciplines.
