Primary Mission and Purpose

The purpose of the program is to sustain interagency law enforcement operations and enhance local law enforcement patrols in an effort to deter and facilitate directed actions to interdict criminal activity. Program participants shall assist in the execution of coordinated border security operations in an effort to:

- Increase the effectiveness and impact of Steady State and Surge Operations.
- Reduce border-related criminal activity in Texas.
- · Implement and increase the effectiveness of operational methods, measures, and techniques for outbound/southbound operations.
- Decrease the supply of drugs smuggled into and through Texas from Mexico.
- Disrupt and deter operations of gang and cartel criminal organizations.
- Decrease specifically targeted tactics (such as conveyance methods) for drugs in the Texas border region.
- Decrease use of specific areas for crime as targeted in directed action missions.
- Increase the effectiveness of air operations mission planning and prioritization.
- Increase the coordination and integration of air-ground team operations to include Texas Military Forces (TMF) aviation, United States Customs and Border Patrol (USCBP) Air and Marine, TXDPS Aircraft Division, and United States Coast Guard (USCG) aviation support.
- Increase the effectiveness of directed action missions based upon intelligence and analysis to ensure they target the most serious threats and are conducted in high pay off areas.
- Increase the number and quality of analytical intelligence products developed at the Unified Command and state levels.
- Increase intelligence based operations at the Unified Command level through integration of TxMap, sector specific information, and intelligence analysis.

- Identify significant border related trends or areas of interest that may be developed into focus areas for future operations.
- Integrate air, ground, marine, and remote operations.
- Participate in operational planning and coordination meetings, information/intelligence sharing meetings, and After Action Reviews (AARs) established by the JOIC.
- Participate weekly on the JOIC Unified Command conference calls or meetings as required by the JOIC.

Eligible applicants must agree to submit the following reports to the JOIC:

Daily Border Incident Assessment Report (BIAR) - The BIAR is the primary incident and information-reporting tool for the grantee in local border security operations. The grantee shall ensure all BIARs conform to the respective standards outlined by the JOIC and are submitted within the timeframes established by the JOIC.

Steady State Report. The grantee shall report all activities that are considered Steady State activities in addition to Enhanced Operation activities to the JOIC. Steady State activities are defined as normal patrol or investigative duties that do not use grant funds, but directly impact the overall local border security mission (organized crime arrests, terroristic activities, weapons trafficking arrests, kidnappings, home invasions with a border or organized crime nexus, illegal immigration, border related murders, gang related murders, or drug trafficking). Enhanced (Surge) Operations originate out of the use of local border security funds when the local agency chooses to increase the hours of patrol or investigative bodies.

Eligibility Requirements

Uniform Crime Reporting - Eligible applicants operating a law enforcement agency must be current on reporting Part I violent crime data to the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) for inclusion in the annual Uniform Crime Report (UCR). To be considered eligible for funding, applicants must have submitted a full twelve months of accurate data to DPS for the most recent calendar year.

Criminal History Reporting - Entitles receiving funds from HSGD must be located in a county that has an average of 90% or above on both adult and juvenile dispositions entered into the computerized criminal history database maintained by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) as directed in the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure, Chapter 60. The disposition completeness percentage is defined as the percentage of arrest charges a county reports to DPS for which a disposition has been subsequently reported and entered into the computerized criminal history system.

DUNS - Eligible applicants must have a DUNS (Data Universal Numbering System) number assigned to its agency.

System for Award Management - Eligible applicants must be registered in the federal System for Award Management (SAM) database and maintain an active registration throughout the grant period.

Program Income

Project Summary :

El Paso, Texas is directly across the Mexican border of Ciudad (Cd.) Juarez, Chihuahua, Mexico. The ongoing territorial drug war which exists between rival cartels within the large metropolitan area of Ciudad Juarez has decreased since January 2011. As the Mexican cartel turf war is subsiding, Drug Traffic Organization's (DTO's), which are often composed of a combination of the Mexican cartel and Transnational Gangs are organizing themselves again and are gaining strength in numbers, building their criminal enterprises. Although, the numbers show a decrease in homicides, there remains a continuous number of homicides that occur on a daily basis in Cludad Juarez. The ongoing violence in Ciudad Juarez still poses an immediate threat of a spillover into the City and County of El Paso, a threat that has existed for the past several years. The immediate shift has moved towards an organized attempt to smuggle humans and narcotics into the United States; furthermore, the shift has attributed to stolen vehicles, weapons, ammunition, and currency illegally leaving out of the United States into Mexico. Members of the criminal element who are often Fugitives from Justice (FFJ) cross our three land ports located within El Paso, TX. The El Paso Police Department has received Local Border Security grant funds every year since FY-12. Grant funds have been used to conduct southbound bridge checks targeting stolen vehicles, weapons, ammunition, currency, and FFJ's going into Mexico. These bridge checks have proven successful in the location and seizure of currency, ammunition being transported south into Mexico, the recovery of stolen vehicles, and the arrest of numerous wanted persons attempting to cross the international bridges into Mexico. El Paso Police Department personnel will conduct southbound bridge operations at three of the international bridges, land ports that are located within the City of El Paso, Texas. El Paso Police Department personnel will target money, ammunition, stolen vehicles and wanted persons going into Mexico. Strategies used will enhance border security through the coordination of efforts and sharing of information amongst local state and federal law enforcement entities; furthermore, it will assist in the development of new strategies to combat trends associated with the flow of money, ammunition, stolen vehicles and wanted persons into Mexico. Operational times and personnel working each assignment are conditional upon availability of staffing. Staffing levels are estimates and cannot be guaranteed.

Problem Statement :

El Paso, Texas is directly across the Mexican border of Ciudad (Cd.) Juarez, Chihuahua, Mexico, which has a population of over 1.3 million inhabitants (Source: State of Chihuahua CIES). The El Paso-Cludad Juarez community is the largest metropolitan area on the border between the United States and Mexico. It is estimated that this metropolitan area, that is comprised of El Paso, Texas and Ciudad Juarez, has a combined population of approximately of 2.2 million inhabitants (Source: U.S. Census Bureau and State of Chihuahua CIES). The ongoing territorial drug war which exists between Mexican rival cartels within the large metropolitan area of Ciudad Juarez has decreased since January 2011. As the Mexican cartel turf war is subsiding, Drug Traffic Organization's (DTO's), which are often composed of a combination of the Mexican cartel and Transnational Gangs are organizing themselves again and are gaining strength in numbers, building their criminal enterprises. Although, the numbers show a decrease in homicides, there remains a continuous number of homicides that occur on a daily basis in Cludad Juarez. The ongoing violence in Cludad Juarez still poses an immediate threat of a spillover into the City and County of El Paso, a threat that has existed for the past several years. The immediate shift has moved towards an organized attempt to smuggle humans and narcotics into the United States; furthermore, the shift has attributed to stolen vehicles, weapons, ammunition, and currency illegally leaving out of the United States into Mexico. Members of the criminal element who are often Fugitives from Justice (FFJ) cross our three land ports located within El Paso, TX. The reorganization of the criminal enterprises allow them, within the environment presented, an opportunity to help or fund international terrorists and criminal organizations. The limited amount of federal and local law enforcement threatens vulnerable points within the City and County of El Paso and along the United States-Mexican border. Law enforcement partnerships are needed to combat this challenging situation. Local Border Security will provide the means to assist in accomplishing the mission of securing our nation's border.

Existing Capability Levels :

Describe the existing capability levels, including resources that are currently in place to support this project prior to the use of grant funds. Currently the El Paso Police Department is able to conduct Local Border Security Operations between the El Paso, Texas – Ciudad Juarez, Chihuahua, Mexico border, due current funding that was allotted to the department under the FY2016 Local Border Security grant. The emphasis of the operations is to target Mexican criminal enterprises along the El Paso, Texas border that incorporates three land ports within the municipality.

Existing Capability Gaps:

Describe the capability gaps which will be addressed by the project. For federal Homeland Security Grants, include specific references to the regional or statewide State Preparedness Report (SPR).

The existence of threats, vulnerabilities, and consequences that exist as part of criminal enterprises that are a result of a combination of Mexican Cartels and Transnational Tier-1 gangs (Barrio Azteca, Texas Syndicate, and Mexican Mafia) that operate both in El Paso, Texas and Cludad Juarez contribute to an existing capability gap. The El Paso Police Department is understaffed which causes a dilemma for effectively addressing the ever evolving issue because of the personnel shortage. Current proactive operations are primarily accomplished by officers of the department who conduct these operations on an overtime basis; furthermore, these added duties are in addition to their current police responsibilities and have had a positive impact in addressing the issues at hand since FY2012.

Impact Statement :

The project goal is to maintain operations that specifically target the criminal enterprises that are currently in existence along the El Paso, Texas – Cludad Juarez border and tend to harm the local population of Texans living in El Paso by illegal exportation of stolen vehicles, weapons, ammunition, and currency. As well as the apprehension of Fugitives from Justice (FFJ) that may attempt to cross into Mexico or attempt to re-enter the United States illegally. The continuation of the current Local Border Security grant will contribute to the reduction of the current capability gap that was identified previously.

Homeland Security Priority Actions:

Organized Mexican Cartels and Transnational Gangs are the epicenter of

criminal enterprises that are responsible for the illegal smuggling of humans and narcotics into the United States; as well as the illegal exportation of stolen vehicles, weapons, ammunition, and currency out of the United States into Mexico, for the funding of their criminal enterprises. Logically terrorist organizations could use the same methods of illegal importation and exportation to allow terrorists across the El Paso, Texas - Cludad Juarez border. So, it is of vital importance to emphasis efforts to the prevention and disruption of Mexican criminal enterprises in order to curtail the effectiveness of their operations.

Without federal funding, the El Paso Police Department will not be capable of sustaining long term operations of specifically targeting of Mexican criminal enterprises, due to personnel shortage on the department. The current approach will then turn from a proactive approach to a reactive approach and will place local Texan's at risk because of the vulnerabilities associated without funding; therefore, the ongoing need for future grants is of vital importance for the sustainment of local border security along the El Paso, Texas – Ciudad Juarez border.
