On April 15, 2019, City Council was provided a presentation that detailed top ten facility capital improvements throughout the City. This item will provide for funding of the improvements to the Museum of Art facility. These funds are restricted and can only be used on projects within Proposition Two of the 2012 Quality of Life program.

WHEREAS, on February 5, 2013 the City Council approved the “2012 Quality of Life Bond Proposed 3 Year Roll-out Plan”; and

WHEREAS, on January 25, 2016 the City Council approved the list of project referenced as the “City of El Paso 2012 Quality of Life Bond Issuance FY2020 Plan” (“Plan”), as the 2012 Quality of Life Bond 5 Year implementation plan for FY2015-2020; and

WHEREAS, on February 4, 2019 the Plan was amended to include projects originally planned for FY2021-2023 in order for the implementation of the identified projects to begin by FY2020; and

WHEREAS, the Plan includes the Museum and Cultural Arts Facilities Improvements project with an allocation of \$11,250,000.00 of quality of life funds; and

WHEREAS, the estimated cost of the museum and cultural arts facilities improvements exceed the quality of life funds currently allocated to the project; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to allocate additional funds to the Museum and Cultural Arts Facilities Improvements project in the amount of \$515,584.37 from savings generated from completed Proposition 2 of the 2012 Quality of Life Bond projects and investment interest earnings of Quality of Life funds in the amount of \$992,571.94;

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EL PASO:



City Facilities Overview

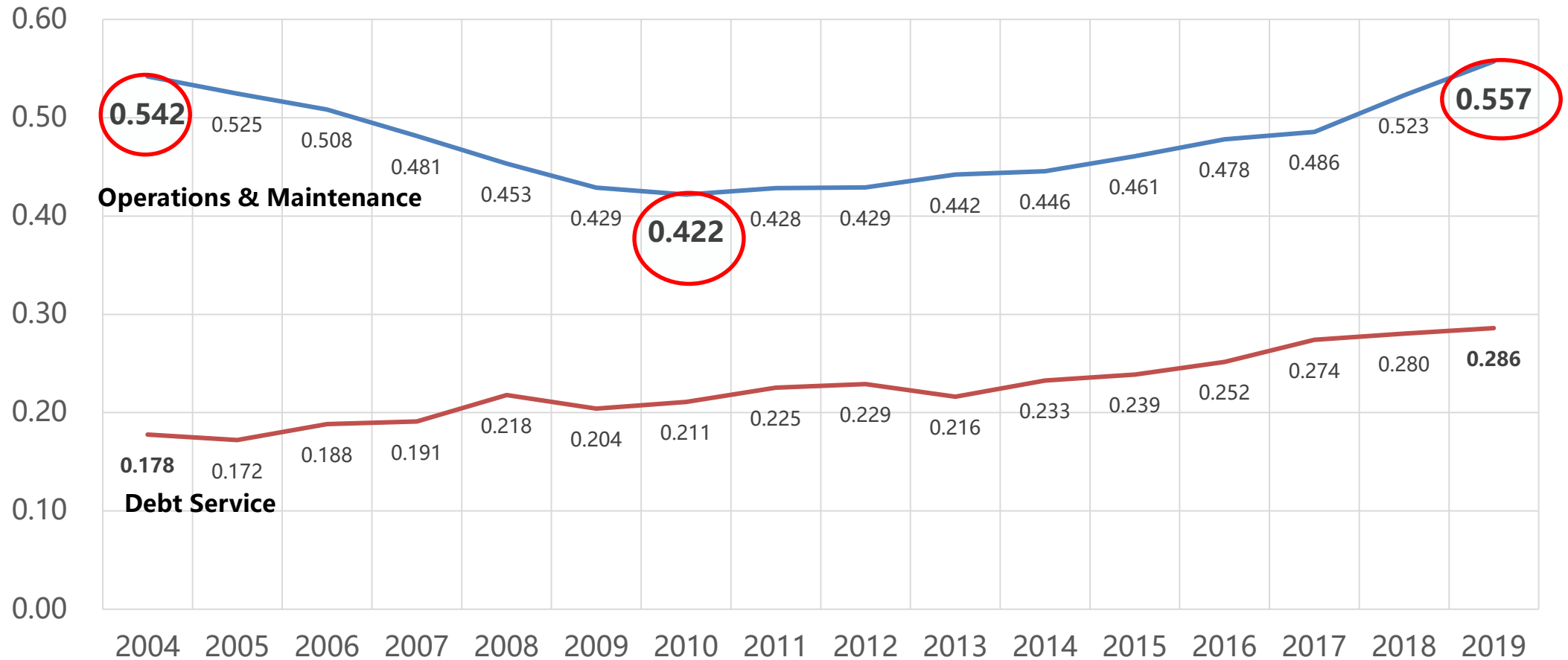
- There are approximately 239 buildings owned by the City of El Paso and used for various community services; accounting for 3.2 million square feet of useable facility space
- Average age of City buildings is 41 years; 56% of buildings over 30 years old
- Most of our facility problems are “system” related
 - Many mechanical and structural systems are past their useful life, are deteriorating, and in need of replacement; common problem is lack of available parts for older systems
 - Example of a system: HVAC system includes controlling systems, air conditioner units, heating boiler, plumbing, electrical, fans, etc., multiple interwoven components

Difficult Budget Years Necessitated Decisions Impacting Present Day

- During difficult budget years over the last decade, some budget cuts exacerbated present day facility problems, examples:
 - **Roofing Program** – Five of six positions for roof maintenance were deleted in the budget with intent to utilize contractual services for this task; contractual services were subsequently cut
Roofing issues are among Cities most serious facility problems
 - **Facility Painting** – Positions deleted in budget (6 painters) with intent to utilize contractual services for this task; contractual services were subsequently cut
Facility exteriors should be painted every 10 to 15 years
 - Budget cuts to Facility Contracts and Materials line items
Decreased budget during a period of reliance on contracts and materials
 - Prior to the 2015 merger of the General Services Department and the Street Department, budget problems forced deferring some facility maintenance items
Maintenance was limited to emergencies; problems not handled got worse

Facility Problems Disrupting City Services Over The Past Year

- **El Paso Museum of Art** – Roof and HVAC problems have necessitated gallery space closures; scheduling of exhibitions and other related programming events have been impacted
- **Fire Department Maintenance Facility** - Roof leaks and penetrations have impacted Fire Department operations, specifically during rain events; because of safety concerns on accessing the roof the air conditioning units cannot be serviced
- **City 3** - Electrical system failure recently led to a 3-day closure of the site; this disrupted department operations for Parks and Recreation, Community Development and Development Services as employees were forced to move to temporary office space
- **Jimmy Ochoa Park** – Safety problems necessitated removal of all ballfield lights – until new lights are installed, the field is no longer available for night baseball; potentially impacting up to 1,300 regular users
- **Nations Tobin Park** - Safety problems necessitated removal of all ballfield lights – until new lights are installed, the field is no longer available for night baseball; potentially impacting up to 500 regular users
- **Hawkins Pool** – Roof problems caused temporary service closures; water intrusion from roof leaks affected pool water chemistry and have caused rust deterioration to metal ceiling components
- **Multipurpose Center** - Roof problems caused temporary service closures; water intrusion from roof leaks affected window seals, showers, basketball court, weight room, and dance studio; building also in need of exterior repainting

4	Viscount - Multipurpose Center	Roof Repair	One section of the roof is detached from decking and needs to be repaired; intent is to replace all six roof sections	\$600,000
5	Hawkins Pool	Roof Replacement	The roof membrane has detached from the roof deck as a result of deterioration and requires complete roof replacement	\$300,000
6	Chalio Acosta Sports Center	HVAC/Roof Repair	Evaporative (6) A/C units have surpassed useful life and units have deteriorated and are spilling water onto metal roof which has caused corrosion and damage; recommendations to replace with more efficient refrigerated units	\$180,000
7	Fire Station #15	Roof Replacement	Roof is over 30 years old and needs replacement; current flat roof has ponding during rain events, needs to be replaced with a slope/pitched roof that will drain the water	\$250,000
8	City 2	HVAC - Control system	HVAC control system not compatible with the mechanical system; causes temperature control problems that become significant during warmer months - especially in server rooms and 5th floor	\$1,000,000
9	EPPD Central Regional Command	HVAC System	Needs upgrade to a Metasys Control system for HVAC; current controls are outdated requiring manual control - in need of an efficient temperature control system	\$90,000
10	Fire Department 8600 Montana	Roof Replacement	Corrugated metal roof needs complete replacement with installation of new I-beam support to be spaced every five feet	\$500,000

Long Term Facility Improvements

- Citywide Facility Maintenance Assessment gathered information of the critical facility maintenance issues at City facilities
- This prioritized facility maintenance issues into different tiers; the highest priorities are those that affect the operability of the buildings such as roofing systems, HVAC systems, electrical systems, and plumbing systems

- Staff will be presenting options to address these needs at a future date as many require a plan that would likely stretch over a multi-year period; the Facilities team will continue addressing lower tier problems as the operating budget allows

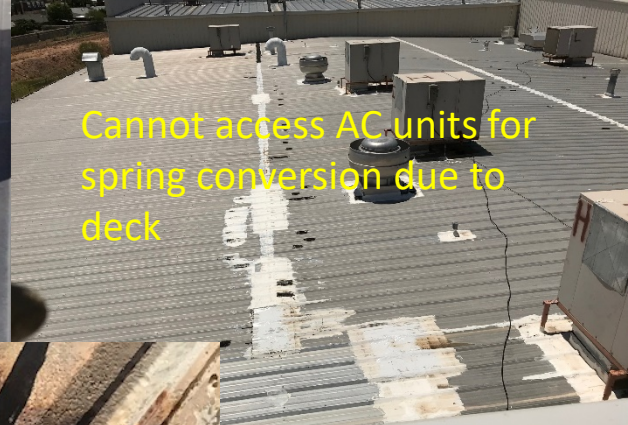

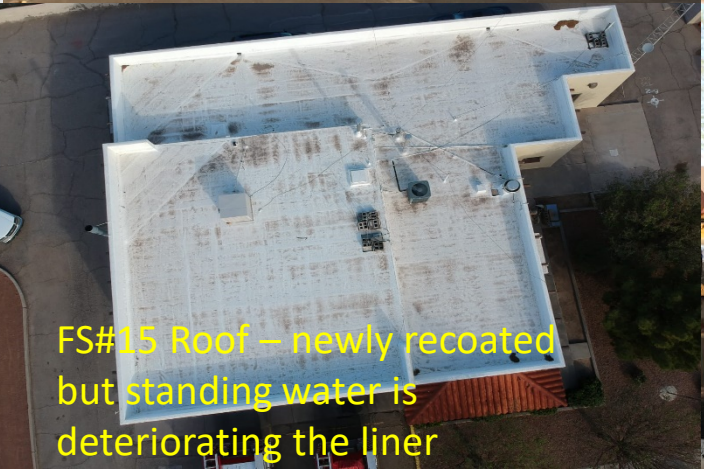

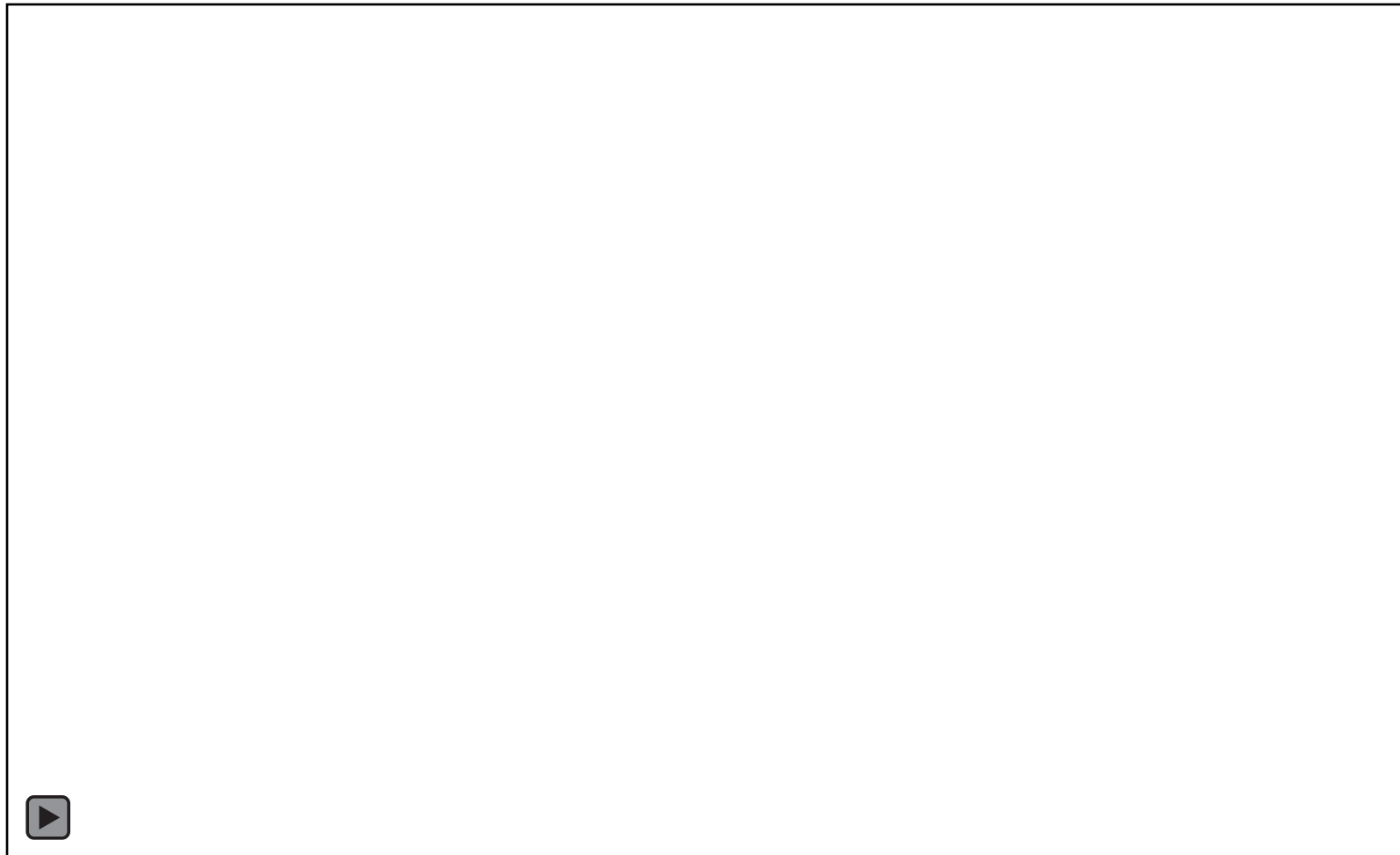

TXDOT Landscaped Medians



State Owned Landscaped Medians

- Feb. 2018 - TxDOT notified the City they will not be maintaining landscaped rights of way on non-controlled access state roads and cite this is a City responsibility under the Municipal Maintenance Agreement
- In the past when the City has accepted maintenance responsibility for landscape medians on state right of way we have entered into separate maintenance agreements with TxDOT for specific locations; examples of agreements approved by City Council:
 - April 19 2005 – Council approved a Landscape Cost Sharing Agreement on Dyer Street from US54 to Hondo Pass and McCombs from Dyer to US54
 - October 18, 2005 – Council approved an agreement for the maintenance of landscaped elements along Mesa street from Baltimore to Sun Bowl Drive
 - December 17, 2013 – Council approved an agreement for the maintenance of landscaped elements and the public art lighting on I-10
 - July 8, 2014 – Council approved an agreement for the maintenance of landscaped elements along Transmountain Road (east and west)
 - July 8, 2014 – Council approved the maintenance agreement for the maintenance of landscaped elements of the City's Brio stations along Mesa street
 - September 4, 2018 – Council approved a maintenance agreement for the maintenance of landscaped elements along the programmed expansion of Montana Avenue
