Narrative Information

Overview

The purpose of the Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) is to support state and local efforts to prevent terrorism and other catastrophic events and to prepare the Nation for the threats and hazards that pose the greatest risk to the security of the United States. HSGP provides funding to implement investments that build, sustain, and deliver the 32 core capabilities essential to achieving the National Preparedness Goal (the Goal) of a secure and resilient Nation. The building, sustainment, and delivery of these core capabilities are not exclusive to any single level of government, organization, or community, but rather, require the combined effort of the whole community. HSGP supports core capabilities across the five mission areas of Prevention, Protection, Mitigation, Response, and Recovery based on allowable costs.

Primary Mission and Purpose

State Homeland Security Program (SHSP): Supports state, Tribal and local preparedness activities that address high-priority preparedness gaps across all core capabilities where a nexus to terrorism exists. All investments must be consistent with capability targets set during the Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) process, and gaps identified in the State Preparedness Report (SPR).

Many activities which support the achievement of target capabilities related to terrorism preparedness may simultaneously support enhanced preparedness for other hazards unrelated to acts of terrorism. However, all SHSP projects must assist grantees in achieving target capabilities related to preventing, preparing for, protecting against, or responding to acts of terrorism.

Eligibility Requirements

Criminal History Reporting Entities receiving funds from HSGD must be located in a county that has an average of 90% or above on both adult and juvanile dispositions entered into the computerized criminal history database maintained by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) as directed in the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure, Chapter 60. The disposition completeness percentage is defined as the percentage of arrest charges a county reports to OPS for which a disposition has been subsequently reported and entered into the computerized criminal history system.

Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Eligible applicants operating a law enforcement agency must be current on reporting Part 1 violent crime data to the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) for inclusion in the annual Uniform Crime Report (UCR). To be considered eligible for funding, applicants must have submitted a full twelve months of accurate data to DPS for the most recent calendar year.

Note: The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) has established a goal set by the Texas Legislature for all local law enforcement agencies to implement and report crime statistics data by using the requirements of the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) no later than September 1, 2019. Additionally, the Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI) will collect required crime statistics solely through the NIBRS starting January 1, 2021. Due to these upcoming state and federal deadlines, grantees are advised that eligibility for future grant funding may be tied to compliance with NIBRS Financial grant assistance for transitioning to NIBRS may be available for your jurisdiction from the Criminal Justice Division (CD).

Program Requirements

National Incident Management System (NIMS) Implementation Grantees are required to implement NIMS. The NIMS uses a systematic approach to integrate the best existing processes and methods into a unified national framework for incident management across all homeland security activities including prevention, protection, response, mitigation, and recovery. Grantees must use standardized resource management concepts for resource typing, credentialing, and an inventory to facilitate the effective identification, dispatch, deployment, tracking and recovery of resources.

Emergency Management Plans (Intermediate Level)

Cities and counties must have a current emergency management plan or be a legally established member of an interjurisdictional emergency management program with a plan on file with the Texas Department of Public Safety, Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM). Plans must be maintained throughout the entire grant performance period and must be at least at the Intermediate Level. If you have questions concerning your Emergency Management Plan (preparedness) level, contact your Emergency Management Coordinator (EMC) or your regional Council of Governments (COG). Program Income

- Prevention. Prevent, avoid or stop an imminent, threatened or actual act of terrorism.
 Protection. Protect our citizens, residents, visitors, and assets against the greatest threats and hazards in a manner that allows our interests, aspirations, and way of life to thrive.
- Mitigation. Reduce the loss of life and property by lessening the impact of future disasters.
- Response. Respond quickly to save lives, protect property and the environment, and meet basic human needs in the aftermath of a catastrophic incident.
- Recovery. Recover through a focus on the timely restoration, strengthening and revitalization of infrastructure, housing and a sustainable economy, as well as the health, social, cultural, historic and environmental fabric of communities affected by a catastrophic incident.

Briefly summarize the project, including proposed activities and intended impact. This project assist with sustaining and improving EI Paso Fire Departments ability to protect, respond and recover from incidents as a result of terrorism. The project supports a regional Type I Hazardous Materials Team and a Type II Urban Search and Rescue Team. EI Paso's specialized teams support the following core capabilities: operational coordination, threat and hazard identification, environmental response/health and safety, situational assessment and mass search and rescue operations. The teams were created using UASI funding. The loss of funding severely threatens the ability for the teams to continue to provide the expected level of service both locally and regionally. The project addresses gaps with training and equipment needed to maintain and improve response and recovery abilities. The identified purchase items include wearable Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) to protect from incidents of terrorism and weapons of mass destruction, FT-1R portable chemical identifier, and equipment utilized during structural collapse incidents arising from terrorist attacks. The PPE being replaced no longer supported by the manufacture. This portable chemical identifier is corpable of identifying a wide range of chemicals that may be used as a WMD incident reducing the risk of exposure. This project will also provide the USAR team with technical level equipment used to increase search capabilities during structural collapse events.

Problem Statement :

El Paso is located in far West Texas and is isolated. El Paso's specialized teams have the capability to protect communities from the consequences of all hazards, both natural and human-caused. The potential for terrorist activities grow daily. El Paso supports a Type I Hazardous Materials Team, Type II Urban Search and Rescue Team, Type III Incident Management Team and a Water Rescue Team which is deployable with Texas Task Force One. These teams are needed in the region to reduce the risk of chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear, and high-yield explosives incidents through early detection and identification. These teams increase the state's ability to minimize damage and loss of life due to terrorism and criminal attacks through their emergency response. The El Paso region dails with the continued war on draw Inso of life due to terrorism and criminal attacks through their emergency response. The El Paso region deals with the continued war on drug trafficking that is unique the US/Mexico border, human trafficking, mass migration, and the growing potential for terrorism. Within the RGCOG Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) 2018 identifies two scenarios in which the equipment and training provided by this project would help to close defined capability gaps. As identified in the RGCOG THIRA during a human-caused terrorist chemical attack, a human caused radiological incident (page 2), and a Hazmat Chemical Release (page 5), the El Paso Fire Department Specialty Teams play a significant role in hazard mitigation, response, intelligence gathering, and recovery for the region.

Existing Capability Levels :

EXISTING Lapability Levels : Describe the existing capability levels, including resources that are currently in place to support this project prior to the use of grant funds. El Paso's specialized teams are the only teams in the West Texas Region with the capability to protect communities from the consequences of all hazards, both natural and human-caused. The project supports a regional Type I Hazardous Materials Team, a Type III Urban Search and Rescue Team, a Type III Incident management team and a Water Rescue Team that is deployable with Texas Task Force One. The El Paso Fire Department operates annually from a budget set by tax base and utilizes grants to assist in attaining equipment and training to support its specialized teams that would be otherwise unattainable due to budget constraints.

The project is intended to sustain and enhance current response capabilities locally and regionally in response to terrorism. It will provide the necessary equipment to ensure that the regional specialty team are capable to respond and protect the lives of those within Texas Disaster District 8. With the provided equipment and training the teams will be able to rapidly detect chemicals related to mass destruction minimizing the risk to personnel and the community. All of which are identified as current capability gaps within the 2018 RGCOG SPR.
