 - **a.** Discussion and Action: Approval of the Minutes from July 22nd, August 19th and November 18th Meetings

Austin Allen requests that Mardi Gras, March 1st is on the back of Lt. Shields mind, board may need to fund officers. Discussion ensues regarding OT officer funding for February and March.

Sammy Holaschutz requests towing statistics since towing initiative started.


Phase 1: Alley Activation and Revitalization

Project Goals

- Enhance public health by offering a safe and pleasant pedestrian pathway opportunity.
- Promote a sense of place for the community.
- Beautify the alley by adding amenities such as decorative resurfacing, lighting, sidewalks, bulb-outs, and artwork.
- Thoughtfully and strategically incorporate design elements that reduce the negative connotation of an alley and address safety/drainage challenges.

Phase 1 improvements consist primarily of resurfacing in order to address existing safety and drainage issues. This phase would be to design initial improvements to beautify this alley to make it more inviting and walkable space for pedestrians, but also maintain adequate space for vehicular travel for those who still need access through the entire alley (i.e. utility/emergency vehicles, trash-pickup, general access, etc.). Since the alley is still an existing right-of-way, the intent for phase 1 is to allow for safe pedestrian movement through this pathway, while also allowing for vehicular movement as well, and to include elements to begin to create an overall enhanced pedestrian circulation network that can be improved through phases over time.



Integrating art and character brings life and identity to the alley. Blank walls can be used for street art, bringing color and culture to the alley for a brighter community.


