Mr. Smith gave a PowerPoint presentation and explained the applicant is proposing one school site. The proposed site is 23.298 acres and is located in the Hillside Development Area (HDA). Staff has not received any adverse comments from City Departments; Staff recommends approval.

Mr. Dallo explained FEMA arroyos 38A and 38B drain into Pond Number 3; therefore, the flow path no longer exists.

Ms. Cuellar stated she had researched ordinances regarding the preservation of arroyos dating back to 1997. The current code, states in the event the developer intends to use an arroyo for drainage purposes; as part of their storm water design or as part of its drainage system, any improvements to the arroyo must be approved by the City Engineer and the City Plan Commission. However, if the developer does not intend to use an arroyo for drainage purposes, leaving the arroyo in its natural state, approval by the City Engineering and City Plan Commission is not required. Regarding protecting the health, safety, and welfare of the public, Ms. Cuellar explained, a developer cannot develop in an arroyo if there are public health, safety, and welfare issues. She made comments regarding the Wildwood Arroyo development.

Mr. Smith noted the Cimarron Land Study was approved by the City Plan Commission at the March 10, 2011 CPC meeting.

Mr. Sal Alonzo, CSA Design Group, concurred with Staff comments and explained drainage, below the school site, will be contained in the underground storm sewer system.

Board Members and Staff discussed Ordinance 016912 specifically the Storm Water Management Requirements and drafting language for TDR (Transfer of Development Rights).

Chair Wakeem asked if any members of the public wished to comment. There were none.

No further questions or comments from the Board.

Prior to the motion, Chair Wakeem let it be known that he did not like it, but we have to approve it.

Mr. Smith advised Board Members that Resler Ponding Area 4 is located close to the Cimarron area. He gave a PowerPoint presentation and explained the applicant has resubmitted the application to do some grading that is outside the previous plat boundaries. The subject property is located within the Hillside Development Area (HDA) and will be used for runoff from development of the Ranchos Las Lomas Land Study. Additionally, the applicant is proposing to construct a desilting station. Staff has not received any adverse comments and recommends approval.

Mr. Dallo explained there would be fencing at the end of the arroyo; there will not be fencing from the arroyo. He did not know the exact percentage of the slope; however, he thought it would be pretty shallow in certain areas. The detention basin will be enlarged/deepened; however, the area for the proposed desilting station will be small. Mr. Dallo explained the purpose/function of a desilting station.

Mr. Francisco Campa, Conde, Inc., was present.

Regarding the desilting station, Mr. Bilderback remarked, there is nothing the Board can do before they clean this out and create the opposite of what we'd like them to do. This is one place that is working; now it won't be.

Mr. Cedillos explained he has been working with the applicant regarding the details of the project; accessibility, filtering of the water, stability of the slopes, etc. Once the Board approves and accepts it, the PSB will take it over.

Ms. Balin requested there be a gentle slope at the entrance to the arroyo for the wildlife.

#### FOR CLARIFICATION

Mr. Bilderback clarified there will not be fencing along the east side of the arroyo, for an extended distance. He commented on an arroyo that was discussed at a previous OSAB meeting and stated that arroyo is now totally enclosed.

Board Members and Staff discussed the 72-hour rule; there should not be any standing water after 72 hours. Chair Wakeem would like the ponding water to remain when it happens naturally. He suggested installing a tower to handle the overflow.

Ms. Balin suggested installing an aerator, to keep the water circulating.

Ms. Cuellar responded there may be a way to accomplish what the Board is requesting; Staff will confer.

Chair Wakeem asked if members of the public wished to comment. There were none.

No further comments or questions from the Board.

Mr. Eddie Garcia gave a PowerPoint presentation and explained the property is 2.20 acres in size. He noted the applicant is proposing a Planet Fitness exercise facility.

Chair Wakeem asked if members of the public wished to comment. There were none.

Mr. Tony Uribe, Jr., P.E., Texas Department of Transportation, gave a PowerPoint presentation on Spur 276, LP 375, SH20 (Doniphan), and IH-10. (presentation on file)

Regarding channels, Chair Wakeem congratulated TxDOT for changing their design from all concrete channels to using less expensive, more natural material(s).

Ms. Balin was pleased with TxDOTs idea regarding arch structures. She suggested TxDOT design their bridges to be bat friendly; bat bridges make excellent tourist attractions.

Mr. Tolbert explained Staff is currently drafting a new landscape ordinance. He wondered if the proposed SPUR 276 walking paths would meet the proposed ordinance requirements.

Mr. Lopez gave an overview of the proposed landscaping and buffering requirements.

Mr. Uribe responded he would make every effort to meet the requirements. Regarding arroyo 41A, Mr. Uribe explained, the property west of Doniphan will not be touched other than what is necessary to widen the road for the intersection and to accommodate the passing vehicle lane. He commented on CFS and wind velocity.

Mr. Bilderback asked if TxDOT has a landscape architect in El Paso and/or would TxDOT be hiring a landscape architect.

Mr. Uribe responded there are no plans to hire a landscape architect for the project. However, he does consult with an in-house landscape technician here and in Austin.

Regarding the proposed wetland areas, Mr. Cedillos asked if TxDOT would remove the salt cedar trees; the trees are not native to this area.

Mr. Uribe responded most of the trees have been removed.

Chair Wakeem asked if members of the public wished to comment. There were none.

No further comments or questions from the Board.

Regarding the ponding area, Chair Wakeem requested vegetation be allowed to flourish.

Mr. Thomas had concerns regarding the right-of-way, hike and bike trails, and deceleration lane.

Board Members and Staff discussed why the Stormwater Advisory Committee did not approve the Knapp Properties as a stormwater utility project.

- A. Must have a stormwater function; and
- B. Have a high risk of development in the future

Board Members and Staff discussed the origin and function of the Stormwater Advisory Committee.

At the previous OSAB meeting, Mr. Coronado explained, he briefed the Board on changes to the SmartCode Ordinance 2021. At that meeting Board Members had several questions. In response to those questions, Mr. Coronado presented PowerPoint presentations on the ASARCO West and ASARCO East Regulating Plans. (copies of PowerPoint presentations on file)

9. Discussion and Action on subcommittee recommendations regarding Chapter 18.46 (Landscape) of the El Paso City Code.

Chair Wakeem explained the OSAB Subcommittee met yesterday and finalized its recommendations for Board Member's consideration and recommendation to City Council. Approval by City Council is tentatively scheduled for the May 10, 2010 meeting.

Mr. Lopez explained the importance of landscaping in new neighborhood development. City Council directed Staff to focus on and create more pedestrian friendly streets; in order to create a public realm. Creating streets not only for vehicles; but for multi-modes of transportation – enhancing the pedestrian experience on roadways. The most important and cost effective way to enhance the pedestrian experience is planting street trees on roadways. The proposed ordinance will require street trees for new residential and commercial development, the rest of the regulations of this ordinance apply to commercial development only.

Per the PowerPoint presentation, Mr. Lopez referred to the table outlining the recommendations vetted to multiple stakeholders. In addition to the OSAB Subcommittee, the proposed ordinance was presented to the Parks & Recreation Tree Board. He noted the recommendations of the OSAB Subcommittee and Tree Board are very similar.

Per the same chart, Mr. Lopez expanded on the following requirements per the existing Code, proposed ordinance, and recommendations of the OSAB Subcommittee and Tree Board:

- Landscapable Area;
- 2. Parkway;
- 3. Frontage Landscape Buffer;
- 4. Buffer between Commercial and Residential:
- 5. Plant Units; and
- 6. Parking Lot Trees

## **PLANT UNITS**

Regarding the proposed language – only permit a palm tree as 5-gallon shrubs – Chair Wakeem stated, the OSAB Subcommittee voted not to give credit for palm trees. People can plant palm trees; however, credit would not be given.

Mr. Lopez responded the Tree Board recommended permitting palm trees up to 10% of the required coverage. The original draft ordinance stated utilizing palm trees as 5 gallon shrubs was permissible; however, you could not exceed 50%.

Board Members recommended <u>not</u> to give credit for palm trees.

Staff and Board Members discussed the proposed language "With a minimum of 75% coverage for plant material".

# PARKING LOT TREES

Mr. Cedillos suggested including language in the ordinance whereby "plants need to be recessed instead of in raised beds or raised planters".

Mr. McElroy responded Staff has discussed the possibility of a giving credit to developers that orient their building toward the street.

Chair Wakeem asked if members of the public wished to comment. There were none.

No further comments or questions from the Board.







# Summary of Opportunity Areas



















A Green Infrastructure Plan for El Paso
